ALASKA FEDERATION OF NATIVES VICE PRESIDENT NELSON ANGAPAK RETIRES

Whether it's fighting for subsistence rights or researching land claims, for decades Nelson Angapak has been fighting for Alaska Native rights. He has worked with Calista Corporation and the Alaska Federation of Natives (AFN) to actively champion numerous efforts benefiting Alaska Native people. On June 1, 2013 Nelson retired, leaving behind a legacy of hard work and dedication.

GROWING UP

Nelson was born in Kinak, a village in the Calista Region that no longer exists and grew up in Tuntutuliak, a community about 50 miles south of Bethel. The isolated village is mostly Yup'ik Eskimos living a traditional subsistence lifestyle. Nelson grew up speaking Yup'ik and during his upbringing he was taught to appreciate the beauty of his culture and traditional values. When he graduated high school in 1965 he left to study

HAVE YOU THOUGHT OF UPDATING YOUR WILL?

Calista Corporation greatly appreciates those Shareholders who have made new wills or updated their existing stock wills. In April, Shareholder Records Specialist Marie Yako traveled to Aniak for the Kuskokwim Native Association Elders and Youth Conference. During the conference Marie helped Elders update their wills.

"There were a lot of Elders who were happy we were there," said Marie. "They wanted to update their wills."

Marie was able to help the Elders fill out the proper paperwork, get them notarized and signed by witnesses. During the conference Marie collected 29 wills.

Updating your ANCSA stock will is an essential part of ensuring your wishes are followed when it comes to deciding who will receive your corporation stock. Important life changes should trigger thinking about making proper adjustments to your will. Marriage, divorce or having a child should be reflected in the terms of your will.

"When there are wills to govern the stock transfers, it simplifies and makes the stock transfers easier. It allows the stock to be transferred according to the testator's wishes," said Marie.

at Fort Lewis College in Colorado. He decided to pursue a bachelor of arts degree in mathematics.

"One and one is always two, one minus one is always zero. You don't have to understand English to understand mathematical logic, and I was still learning to speak English," Nelson said.

Nelson finished his mathematical degree on August 6, 1969. It is a day he will always remember, but as it turned out the next day was an even bigger one.

"The very next morning I checked my mailbox for the very last time. August 7, 1969, that was the day I received my draft papers."

Nelson was drafted into the U.S. Army and served for almost two years. He was stationed in Turkey and worked in the intelligence department. He says his time in the service taught him important lessons in communications.

When Nelson was released from his service in the U.S. Army he returned to his home state. In the summer of 1972 he was hired for a job with the Lands and Natural Resources Department at Calista Corporation. 1972 was a historical year for Alaska Natives and Calista Corporation. The previous December, the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (ANCSA) had been signed into law. Alaska Native Corporations had only a few years to make their land selections. With this limited timeframe the Calista Lands and Natural Resources Department worked feverishly to help the many village corporations of the Calista Region make their selections.

"It was very stressful," Nelson said. "For those of us that were involved in the land selection process, that was our primary interest. The goal was to meet the deadline and we didn't worry too much about the significance of what we were doing."

It was the land selection committee that ultimately helped Calista Corporation secure the surface rights to the Donlin Creek Property.

"We had a person named Eddie Hoffman on the Calista Board and he used to tell us, 'there is gold in them there hills.' So, we did some geological exploration and low and behold, there seems to be some potential there."

The land selection committee shared the information with the nearest village, Crooked Creek, which selected it and the subsurface rights went to Calista. Today, the Donlin Gold mining project is one of the largest known undeveloped gold deposits in the state and after 16 years of environmental, geological and technical studies, it is in the permitting phase.

"I have been keenly aware of what has been happening there and I think they are doing a good job," said Nelson. "I think at some point Calista will become a major contributor to the 7(i) pool of ANCSA and that is very exciting for me."

In addition to his work in the Lands and Natural Resources Department, Nelson served as the President and Vice President of Calista from 1980 to 1988.

ALASKA NATIVE RIGHTS

Nelson's influence reaches far outside the Calista Region. He lobbied for the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act, passed by Congress and signed into law on December 2, 1980. The act created new conservation systems like the Yukon Delta National Wildlife Refuge. Nelson also advocated for native preference for hunting and fishing within the newly created conservation systems.

"As a person who grew up in a village, I saw our way of life. Our economy in rural Alaska is subsistence," said Nelson. "The land provides life and living conditions for our people, you cannot help but be passionate about it."

ALASKA FEDERATION OF NATIVES

Nelson has continued his passion for working on Alaska Native issues through his involvement with AFN. He has been a part of the organization for about 35 years. He served on the Board of Directors and in 1979, delegates

selected him to be the first ever Chairman of the Board. Prior to his retirement this year, he was the Vice President.

"AFN is an excellent platform from which to work on issues that will improve the life of the people of Alaska."

He has advocated for ways to reduce the cost of energy in rural Alaska, Native allotments for veterans and subsistence issues.

THE FUTURE

Nelson is excited for the next step in his life and just like every other decision in his life, retirement was strategically planned.

"I retire on June 1, that is when fishing season begins,"


Nelson credits his family and faith in God for his many accomplishments. He has been married to his wife Natalie for 14 years, and between the two of them they have six children and eight grandchildren.

Although he is too modest to take any credit, Nelson agrees that through the hard work on Alaska Native issues there are exciting new opportunities for his grandchildren and other Youth.

"I think ANCSA has opened the doors to where we were not able to go before. I hope when kids graduate from high school, they will look at educational opportunities so they can contribute to betterment of the people of our Region."

He is also proud of the progress Calista has made and is excited to see where it is going. Nelson applauds the corporation for diversifying its businesses and its succession planning.

"When corporations were first organized we basically had no businessmen to guide us. Just 40 years later, our folks are running them. We have young men and women, very highly educated in every field, playing major roles in improving lives. Our folks have better employment opportunities and Calista operates in quite a few states. It has created employment, for our folks and for people living in our Region."

The Board may reject a valid shareholder proposal if the shareholder has already submitted three previous proposals to be considered at the same meeting or if a similar proposal has already been submitted for the same meeting. The Board may reject a proposal that contains false or misleading information. The Board may direct legal counsel to revise the proposed resolution to phrase it in proper form, and the Board may submit an opposing statement to shareholders. The Board may reject a valid shareholder proposal if: (i) the same or a similar proposal or resolution has been submitted and voted on by the shareholders at either of the prior two annual meetings, or at any special meeting within the two years prior to the scheduled date of the meeting for which the proposal is submitted, and (ii) the vote of the shareholders in favor of the previous proposal was (A) less than one-third (33.33%) of the total outstanding shares of Calista if the proposal was to amend the bylaws or other matters requiring more than a majority of those present at the meeting, or (B) less than one-third (33.33%) of the shares voting in person or by proxy at the meeting in question if the matter requires a majority of those present at the meeting to be enacted.

VILLAGE PROFILE: TOKSOOK BAY NUNAKAUYAK

Located on Nelson Island, the 15th largest island in the U.S., residents of the village of Toksook Bay rely on their surroundings to survive. Subsistence fishing and hunting from the Bering Sea provide the majority of people's food. In Toksook Bay, there is a close connection to the maritime environment and other villages on the island.

Toksook Bay is the largest community on the island, with a population estimated to be just under 600 people. Including the other two villages, Tununak and Nightmute, around 1,065 people live on Nelson Island. Nelson Island is named after Edward William Nelson, a naturalist who spent time in the area studying the people and natural resources in the late 1800's. The island is separated from the Alaska mainland by several waterbodies; to the north by the Ningaluk River, to the east by the Kolavinarak River and to the southwest by Etolin Strait. It lies about 115 miles northwest of Bethel and across the water from Nunivak Island.

Yup'ik Eskimos have used the area for thousands of years but the community of Toksook Bay was established as a summer camp in 1964 by residents of Nightmute. The city was incorporated in 1972 and infrastructure was created to support an annual freighter ship, the North Star. A snowmachine trail connects Tununak and Nightmute to Toksook Bay during the winter.

The school, city and tribal councils and commercial fishing are the primary sources of income. Ninety-three residents hold commercial fishing permits.

At the 2012 Annual Meeting of Shareholders, Toksook Bay received the Raymond C. Christensen Community Service Award. The community was recognized for its rich culture and history. Through the teaching and guidance of Elders, Toksook Bay residents are proud of their heritage.

Are You Up-to-Date?

If you have moved recently it is important that you let Calista know your new address. Failing to update your address with Shareholder Records could result in you missing out on important information. Your current address allows us to send you Annual Meeting information, the Storyknife newsletter, distribution checks, data-gathering documents for stock transfers and proxy packets, and other corporation information. The majority of information Calista sends to Shareholders includes opportunities for benefits to both Shareholders and their Descendants. If your address is not correct, you may miss opportunities that could benefit your family.

When undeliverable Shareholder mail is returned to our office, we mark that Shareholder as having an unknown address. Unless we are notified, Calista has no way to determine when a Shareholder's address changes.

You may have left a forwarding address with the U.S. Postal Service when you moved, but the Postal Service will not notify Calista of your address change. When your forwarding period expires, the Postal Service informs us that your mail is undeliverable and returns your Shareholder mailing to Calista.

Additionally, if Shareholder Records is told a Shareholder has moved, we will not make an address change without his or her signature. This procedure ensures that the correct Shareholder's information file is changed because some Shareholders have the same name as several other Shareholders.
